A MESSAGE FROM OUR RABBI

To Mask or Not to Mask – That is the Question

Much has been said and written about wearing masks during the COVID-19 pandemic. Each one of us has to make decisions on where to wear a mask and how often. Some say not at all and some say almost all of the time and everywhere.

Even though we cannot resolve the question for every situation you may encounter, take under consideration that masks are one important way to help prevent the spread of the virus, and saving life and protecting health is important Jewishly and universally. Of course, vaccines and social distancing are also crucial components in stopping the virus and its resulting infections.

In Judaism we have holidays that celebrate and articulate many different concepts and lessons. Guess what? We even have a holiday of masks – Purim!

Masks on Purim remind us how Esther had to hide her Jewish identity for a while until such moment that she came forward to King Achashverosh and told him who she was and why it mattered (saving the Jewish people and herself). Masks on Purim remind us that God is not mentioned in the Book of Esther and seems hidden from view, though may be working behind the scene while the humans in the story take action. Masks on Purim allow us to be someone else for a while and then to surprise others by revealing who we really are by taking off the masks and returning to being ourselves.

Masks against COVID may hide parts of our face for now but allow us to proudly announce who we really are – concerned for others and also for ourselves. Masks against COVID remind us that we have to take action even while God is teaching us behind the scene through the Torah to choose life and protect health as best as we can.

Of course, we are mortal and none of us can escape the possibility and reality of illness and death. We may want to put on a mask and pretend that these are not real concerns. Yet, they are real.

At the end of Purim, the masks come off and we return to our previous state of being. Hopefully and soon, even if not yet, the masks against COVID will be able to come off and we can return to more normal times.

The sages teach us in the Talmud that from when Adar begins (this year Adar II) we increase our joy. Let us hope that as we celebrate the Holiday of Masks that we increase joy for ourselves, our community, the Jewish people and the world.

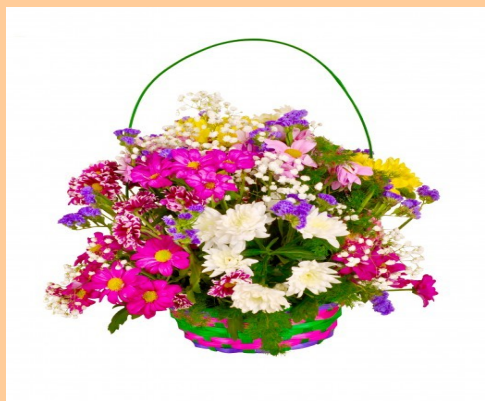

Members are trained on what to do before, during and after a disaster, including basic first aid, CPR, fire safety, light search & rescue and triage. CERT members have assisted with evacuations, food & water distribution, fire and Super Storm Sandy as well as at township events, such as Summerfest, Night Against Crime and Trunk or Treat. When disaster strikes, those trained are able to assist the police and EMS, help themselves and help their neighbors. Successful completion of a CERT course, which includes a written & practical test and background check, are the requirements to become a CERT member. Preparedness is very important. 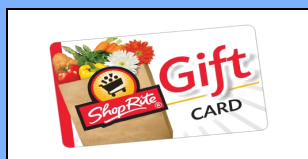

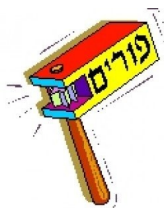

As a tribute to Queen Esther's commitments and actions, we invite you and the spirit of Queen Esther to an imaginary Purim Seudah, the festive meal we enjoy the afternoon of Purim. For your holiday dining pleasure, The Mitzvah Group offers this following fantasy feast.

The Mitzvah Group offers some recipes from the fantasy feast you and your guests can enjoy any time of the year.

Chick Pea Salad

Recipe of Harriet Riss

2 - 1 pound cans chick peas - well drained and patted dry to remove extra moisture

3 scallions - cut crosswise - approx. 1/2 inch

2 tablespoons curly parsley - chopped

1 small green pepper - chopped - approx. 1/2 cup

1/2 cup mayonnaise

1/2 cup salad oil

2 tablespoons wine vinegar

Salt and pepper- to taste

Combine chick peas, scallions, parsley, and green pepper. Mix mayo, oil, vinegar, salt and pepper. Stir into chick pea mixture until peas and vegetables are coated. Adjust seasonings.

Refrigerate until ready to serve. Toss before putting in serving bowl.

This can be prepared up to 2 days before using.



Lemon Poppy Seed Refrigerator Cookies

Recipe of Sara Askin



1 - 1/2 sticks unsalted butter softened to room temperature

1 cup granulated white sugar

1 egg

1 Tablespoon whole or 2 % milk

1 Tablespoon zest from a well scrubbed lemon - (only the yellow part, no white)

1 Tablespoon freshly squeezed lemon juice - pour through strainer - measure to yield 1 TBL

1 - 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract

2 - 1/2 cups all purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup poppy seeds - taste first to be sure they did not become rancid

In a large bowl, cream sugar and butter with an electric mixer on high for 2 minutes, until fluffy.

Beat in egg, milk, zest, lemon juice and vanilla extract.

In a separate bowl, sift flour, salt, and baking soda.

Gradually add to butter mixture. Mix on lowest speed until combined. Fold in poppy seeds until seeds are uniformly distributed.

Prepare 2 sheets of aluminum foil approx. 12 inches long and lightly dust with flour. Divide dough in half and shape into 2 logs - one for each piece of foil. Wrap foil around each log, twist ends to seal. Place flat in refrigerator or freezer until firm enough to cut - approx. 3 hours.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place fresh foil or parchment paper on cookie sheets.

Unwrap dough logs and cut into 1/3 inch slices. Place 2 inches apart on lined cookie sheets.

Bake 8 to 10 minutes until edges are lightly golden. The shorter baking time will result in a chewy cookie. The longer baking time will result in a crispy cookie. Cool on baking sheet for 1 minute. Remove to wire rack to cool completely.

Note: Buy the seeds from a store where there is a rapid turnover of stock. Store leftover seeds in freezer until needed.

Following the funeral, if appropriate, a surviving relative is to be offered a one year courtesy membership or a \$550 credit to a higher priced membership with the welcome invitation to come here to attend services and to say Kaddish.

KADDISH RECITATION

A TBO member or a Kaddish relative of a TBO member who dies is to be remembered and automatically placed on the 11-month Mourner’s List which is read at the time of the recitation of the Mourner’s Kaddish at the end of Shabbat services on Friday nights and Saturday mornings. There is no required donation for this.

A request may be made to add a non-member to the Mourner’s List and have them remembered and included at the time of the recitation of the Mourner’s Kaddish at the end of Shabbat services on Friday nights and Saturday mornings.

A \$300.00 donation is requested for this.
