





A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

I hope everyone is doing well and enjoying the Fall weather!

During November we have some important events to recall/celebrate/keep in mind.

On November 9 - 10 we recall Kristallnacht, or the Night of Broken Glass. It was during this time, in 1938, that the German Nazis attacked Jews and their property. The Nazi-given reason for these attacks was in retaliation for the shooting of a German diplomat, Ernst Von Rath, by a Polish-Jewish student, Herschel Grynszpan, on November 7th. The name "Kristallnacht" refers to the litter of broken glass that was left in the streets after the attacks.

We then have Veterans Day, which was originally known as Armistice Day. Veteran's Day is a federal holiday in the United States which is observed on November 11th and honors military veterans of the US Armed Forces (who were discharged under conditions other than "dishonorable").

Then we have Thanksgiving, which, was created by George Washington in 1789 as a day of giving thanks and celebrating the harvest and blessings of the past year.

At this time, we also need to send our thoughts and prayers to those in Israel and their families here who are worried about them. We hope that the situation will be resolved soon.

Building update:

The parking lot lease with the church has been approved by both parties and our attorney has been notified. Our next step is to have both parties sign the updated lease, which then will need to be filed with the county so that we are in compliance with the resolution. Once completed, we can move forward.

We are almost ready to put our interior work out to bid to contractors. Once we choose a contractor, they will secure the permits so that the work can begin.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR RABBI

Israel at War – What Can We Do?



On October 7, the terrorist group Hamas carried out a program against Jews (and a few non-Jews) in Israel. They murdered over 1400 people – by shooting them, burning them alive, decapitating some, torturing and then gloating over the attacks. They injured over 3,000 people. They captured and took prisoner over 200 people who are still being held as hostages (as of the writing of this essay). On an American scale, it was like having 45,000 people murdered, 100,000 people injured, and 6500 people taken hostage, all in one day! This was like the American 9/11 fifteen times over.

What can we do in the face of such an atrocity? The answer is three-fold: 1) Learn about what happened and its history and context, 2) Help where and when we can and 3) Pray.

1) Learn about what happened and its history and context

This was not just a small terrorist incident, such as a stabbing, car ramming, or a bomb at a bus stop (all sad and tragic). This was a pogrom – brutal, vicious, massive, targeting civilians (and whatever soldiers they can get). Men, women, children, toddlers, infants, elderly, people in wheelchairs, Holocaust survivors were murdered in their homes, shot at point blank, some beheaded, some fetuses cut from their mother's womb, and some burned alive in their homes. Some were taken as hostages to Gaza and paraded through the streets of Gaza as people cheered and celebrated. This attack was planned and in training for about two years. This was the worst day of Jews being attacked and murdered since the Holocaust. Besides the human toll, it shattered the notion of Israel as safe haven from such pogroms which occurred in the Middle Ages, and even in the 20th Century.

This attack was part of a larger picture. Hamas was founded in 1988 whose name in Arabic stands for Islamic Resistance Movement (as it turns out "Hamas" in Hebrew means violence). The Hamas Charter calls for killing Jews and eliminating Israel – already for 35 years. They see all of Israel as "occupied territory" and all Israelis as "enemy combatants" where none are civilians. Over the years, they carried out or inspired others to carry out terrorist attacks. They gained power in Gaza in 2007 – through one election (none since) and a revolt against the rival Palestinian Fatah (Palestinian Authority with President Abbas who is now in the West Bank).

With the many forms of attack, Israel was always on the defense. After a rash of suicide bombers in restaurants, busses, hotel gatherings, Israel built security walls. In the face of rockets, Israel (and the U.S.) developed the Iron Dome rocket interceptor system (without which there would be massive destruction in Israel). Note that 10-15% of rockets fired from Gaza land in Gaza, such as one recently which was fired by another terrorist group (Palestinian Islamic Jihad) which malfunctioned and landed at a Gaza hospital. Tunnels were built under Gaza into Israel for purposes of attacking (and at great expense and use of funds meant for Gaza humanitarian purposes). Many, when dscovered, were destroyed by Israel and a wall was built into the ground. Fire balloons (helium balloons carrying burning contents) were launched drifting west to east and landing in Israel setting fields ablaze. Israel had to shoot them down before they could land themselves. This time, the attack was a coordinated massive land, sea and air invasion (terrorists coming in on motorized hand gliders) of a few thousand Hamas terrorists with a rocket barrage of 4000 missiles in one day. What is Israel supposed to do? Before Israel responded as needed – a small attack led to small response. This time Israel has stated that it has had enough, and that it is time to end Hamas altogether. Israel does not want to kill or injure civilians. Hamas wants to have Palestinian civilians caught in the crossfire as it makes Israel look bad and builds international pressure to stop Israel's efforts to end Hamas. Hamas uses Palestinians as human shields. It knows that Israel does not want to kill civilians, and in fact is counting on it. Most recent example is when Israel told Palestinian civilians to move from northern Gaza to southern Gaza while Israel troops gather on the border of northern Gaza presumably for entering Gaza, Hamas told them to stay in northern Gaza. Of course, there is suffering in Gaza, which is a terrible tragedy. However, Hamas brings this on themselves and onto the Palestinian civilians. Hamas' top leadership do not even live in Gaza as they are based in fancy settings in Qatar. Sometimes mosques, schools or hospitals are hit which is unfortunate. However, it is known that Hamas stores weapons and shoots rockets from mosques, schools and hospitals.

2) Help where and when we can

We can help Israel by learning the above and being able to explain it to others. We can help Israelis by reaching out to anyone we know in Israel or who have relatives and friends in Israel telling them that we are care and that they are not alone. We can help by supporting the efforts of the United States (and other allies) to stand with Israel bringing in major military and financial assets to Israel. We can help by donating to legitimate charitable organizations who are helping on the ground in Israel. Locally, you can donate to the Israel Emergency Campaign of the Jewish Federation of Ocean County. See page 16 for details on doing that.

3) Pray

We can pray. May the memories of those who died be forever a blessing. May those who are wounded have a complete recovery. May those who are captive as hostages be released soon and safely. May all have peace. Amen

Be Prepared – **CERT is Community Emergency Response Team,** a nationwide volunteer organization which most towns have. It backs up First Responders. Members are trained on what to do before, during and after a disaster, including basic first aid, CPR, fire safety, light search & rescue and triage. CERT members have assisted with evacuations, food & water distribution, fire and Super Storm Sandy as well as at township events, such as Summerfest, Night Against Crime and Trunk or Treat. When disas-

ter strikes, those trained are able to assist the police and EMS, help themselves and help their neighbors. Successful completion of a CERT course, which includes a written & practical test and background check, are the requirements to become a CERT member. Preparedness is very important. Please stop in the Temple Beth Or office, located in St. Thomas Lutheran Church, Monday-Friday, 9:00 AM – 1:00 PM to pick up a Disaster Preparedness Guide.
